

MICROECONOMIC ANALYSIS OF PUBLIC POLICY
WWS 522
[PRELIMINARY]

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This course is designed around two goals. The first is to increase understanding of the impact that government economic programs have on individual outcomes in the United States, including employment, income, poverty, family structure and wellbeing. The second is to hone your skills in applied microeconomics. We will focus on readings in public finance and labor economics that are germane to policy debates in Washington. Topics to be covered include (i) a framework for tax analysis, including the impact of different taxes on economic efficiency and equity; (ii) labor market interventions, including minimum wages and earned income tax credits; (iii) government welfare programs and welfare reform; (iv) entitlement programs and Social Security. We will explore these issues theoretically and, for each topic, we will discuss recent empirical results that shed light on the impact of government policies. The problem sets will provide you with more experience in analyzing these topics. These will be due in weeks 3, 5, 8 and 11 of the course. The midterm exam will be given during class time on the last Wednesday before the midterm break, and the final will be given during the University's final exam period.

Evaluation in the course will be based on problem sets, a midterm, a final exam, and classroom participation. Each component will be weighted as follows.
